Thank you brotherhood and sisterhood of Alpha Zeta for giving me the opportunity to serve the fraternity. I have several goals:

- Substantially increase the size of the Alpha Zeta Scholarship Trust
- Improve and update the house
- Assist the undergraduate chapter in rush.

The scholarship trust is an under-utilized resource. Currently, we have \$50,000 in the trust. In 1999 we gave three \$500 scholarships. The trust has sufficient assets to establish an additional \$500 scholarship; if possible this scholarship will be based on need. Our immediate goal should be two more need-based scholarships. Scholarships could be established to honor worthy Alpha Zetans; for example, the Alpha Zeta Frank Anthony Memorial Scholarship. Scholarships could also be named for majors such as the Alpha Zeta Forestry Scholarship.

The board is in the process of identifying areas within the house that need improvement. The first area that needs upgrading is the wiring. The advent of personal computers has dramatically demonstrated the inadequacy of the wiring. Other areas in need of work are the plumbing in the second- and third-floor bathrooms, the dining room floor, the wallpaper in the dining and living rooms, and the basement restrooms.


