- L.K. Metzger owned one of the two bookstores downtown that bought and sold textbooks. Under his ownership, Metzger's provided part-time work for many AZ's, especially during the business rush at the beginning of each semester.

Morrill's own "Urban Legend"?

It is widely known, and verified by eyewitness accounts, that Milton S. Eisenhower, 11th President of the University, was initiated into the Morrill Chapter of Alpha Zeta in 1951. However, it is further believed by many, many respected members of the chapter that U.S. President and brother to Milton, Dwight D. Eisenhower, was also initiated as a Brother of the chapter sometime in the late '40s or early '50s.

There are a few versions of this story, but one of them runs like this: Former

President (Dwight) Eisenhower flew from his Gettysburg farm to State College in a private plane. He was met and driven to the house by his wartime military driver. President Eisenhower spent the day at the house, talked with each boy, was initiated into membership, and then flew back to Gettysburg without the public ever becoming aware of his visit until after his departure. The year and date of his visit are unknown, but all accounts suggest that the initiation of Dwight Eisenhower took place while classes were not in session.

With such a detailed account, it's hard to believe that the event may not have taken place. However, some equally well-

respected members of the chapter who were active around that time reported no knowledge of it. As hard as it is to believe this may not have occurred, it is hard to believe that it occurred without every member of the chapter being well informed of it.

What we know for sure:

- Milton S. Eisenhower, brother of U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, was the President of the University from 1950 to 1956. He was initiated into the chapter in 1951 in a ceremony at the house attended by many onlookers. Eyewitness accounts verify this.
- In June 1955, United States' President Dwight D. Eisenhower indeed visited Penn State and delivered the commencement address to the graduating class. (History of Penn State on the Web, www.psu.edu).

Was Dwight D. Eisenhower initiated during his trip to Penn State for commencement in 1955, or did it occur secretly sometime prior? Are folks getting brothers Dwight and Milton confused, since they were both a "President Eisenhower"? We would like very much to confirm this local legend as fact, and ask that any member with firsthand account of the Initiation of Dwight D. Eisenhower into the Morrill Chapter please contact us with their story!


