

# From Senior Pledge to Senior Advisor and Beyond

With a background in agriculture, it was perfectly fitting that Vince Verbeke, '82, would join Alpha Zeta. He grew up on a small dairy farm and was involved in FFA and 4-H.



He joined the

fraternity his senior year. He pledged after realizing he would need a new place to live when his roommate got married. Through his participation in FFA, he knew **Dean Snook '82**, already a member, who recruited Verbeke to Alpha Zeta.

He enjoyed being part of a large pledge class, and says he and the other pledges always kept their big brothers busy. One memory that sticks out to him is when there were piglets roaming East Hall's stairwell after a pledge party.

"I'll always regret that we didn't tell the

University Park Police that there were three piglets," Verbeke said. "There were only two, and we told them that there were two — opportunity missed."

After graduation, Verbeke went back to work for Veridge Farms. He had worked there since he was eight years old and was a partner with his parents until 1986. He then took a job teaching Vocational Agriculture in Ephrata, Pennsylvania, and later, in Brockway, Pennsylvania.

In 1988, he returned to Penn State after being hired by the Penn State College of Agriculture Sciences, where he worked for the next 25 years. Despite not having a computer background, he worked as a computer trainer and spent his time "learning by doing."

While back on campus, Dale Olver, the previous Senior Advisor of Alpha Zeta, convinced him to become the House Advisor. Olver soon stepped down, making Verbeke the Senior Advisor, a position he served in for the next 22 years. He enjoyed the opportunity to be a part of the organization again and to watch the interactions between the young men and women in the fraternity, all the while learning from them.

"I'm sure that I learned more from the brothers and sisters of Alpha Zeta than I imparted on them," he said.

Verbeke, as he put it, "retired" from Penn State in 2013, and he and his wife, Laurie, moved farther south. They wanted to get out of the harsh Central Pennsylvania winter weather and be closer to their daughter, who is a nurse at Duke.

Verbeke currently works at the University of Virginia Health System in the Surgical Services IT group, which directly supports the computer technology system in the operating rooms. Since 2015, he has been the Interim Manager of SS IT.

Later this year, he and Laurie plan to travel to Munich, Germany, to visit the foreign exchange student they hosted in 1999.

The pavers will be installed in August, prior to the start of the school year and football season. So alumni can come back in the fall and find their piece of AZ history!

# COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS

**Q.** What materials were used for the walkway?

**A.** The walkway is made of compressed concrete pavers in hues of gray, blue and tan.

**Q.** How many bricks are available for purchase?

**A.** We have 240 pavers available in the 9x9 size, 240 in the 6x9 and 270 available in the 6x6.

**Q.** Who can be a part of the front walkway project? What can be inscribed?

**A.** Purchasing a brick and having it engraved is open to all Alpha Zeta alumni and actives, associate members and spouses/family members.

All inscriptions will be centered on the brick in capital letters (except for names that include a small "c" as in

McWilliams). A maximum of 14-15 characters per line (depending on the size of the paver), including spaces and punctuation as separate characters, is allowed. Symbols that appear on a keyboard and Greek letters may be used. Font type is Helvetica Medium.

Inscriptions cannot include commercial, discriminatory or inappropriate messages. The Alpha Zeta Corporation Board reserves the right to deny any paver purchase and inscription that the board deems inappropriate.

Q. How will my brick contribution be used?

**A.** Any proceeds earned from the paver purchases beyond the cost of the front walkway project will be used toward several other necessary house improvement projects.

# Alpha Zeta Still Bearing Fruit for Bill Bowers '69

Bill Bowers pledged Alpha Zeta in 1966, with the hopes of fostering both experience and friendship to enhance his college experience.

Bowers had no doubt that AZ was the fraternity with the promise of both, as his brothers were like-minded in their studies in agriculture, focus on academics as well as strong involvement in leadership for other campus organizations.

"At AZ, I learned to work together with my pledge class to learn the history and traditions of Penn State and AZ. Serving as Censor, I had the opportunity to work with the new pledge class to assimilate them into AZ," Bowers explained. "The responsibility of maintaining a house, developing and maintaining a budget and resolving an occasional disagreement between brothers all served to prepare me for life after college."

Indeed, Bowers used his skills from AZ to propel his career forward for 40 years, with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

Throughout the years, Bowers was able to keep in touch with his brothers. Fellow brother, Alan Wood, worked alongside Bowers for NRCS projects and Brother Frank Resides is Bowers' popular e-mail correspondent when it comes to discussing Penn State football games.

Bowers retired in 2008 as the State Conservation Engineer for Pennsylvania, but never quit working with his love for land and agriculture.

Once again, leadership and friendship were the tools for life Bowers gained at AZ and that foundation continued to bear fruit in retirement.

"In retirement, I have become a Penn State Master Gardener in Cumberland County," Bowers said. "[This] complements my vegetable garden, blueberry and raspberry patches, and my apple/pear/peach orchard of 32 trees."

Bowers is also active in church activities involving choir and finance as well as travels with his wife Mary Ann, with whom he has conquered the world for 48 years.

Their travels range from the redwoods in northern California to Montreal to Iceland and even Florida, where they attend Pittsburgh Pirate spring training games.

They have two grown daughters and two grandchildren who they adore.

"Mary Ann and I especially enjoy watching our granddaughter's ballet performances and grandson's golf matches," Bowers revealed.

No matter how many years go by, however, Bowers will always remember his roots with AZ and the memories he made at the fraternity.

"Alpha Zeta was a great learning, growing and challenging experience for me; many life skills were developed and honed there," he said.

# The Frigid Tundra of Parking Lot 80



Any Penn Stater and Alpha Zetan who remembers Parking Lot 80 on the University Park campus most likely recalls it most vividly in the winter months, when the vast area of asphalt became a windswept wilderness, despite the numerous parked cars which didn't seem to provide any protection to those who traversed its icy expanse.

Located across Bigler Road from East Halls, the large parking lot held about 1,600 spaces mostly allotted for students, but also for faculty and staff, since the 1960s. East Halls students (mostly freshmen), living in the residence halls farthest removed from the center of campus, became most closely acquainted with it as they would often need to cross the lot to reach the rest of campus.

Brutal on cold mornings, Lot 80 gained a reputation and a slew of nicknames, including the Tundra and the Barrens. Students who were late for class and couldn't wait for the Loop might set out on one end of what seemed to be a fairly benign short-cut, only to find after struggling against the ceaseless wind that their destination seemed farther away than before.

Urban legends arose about students who had been "lost" in Lot 80 and only discovered the next spring. Words like "dreadful" and "abominable" were often used to describe

its icy effect. Some claimed that an Arctic vortex existed there where the natural laws of meteorology didn't apply (okay, maybe that was just this writer).

In the summer, however, Lot 80 presented a different appearance, hosting such activities as Penn State Sports Car Club autocrosses, Frisbee games, and Homecoming Float competition judging.

In 2003, Penn State closed the lot for new construction, relocating the parking spaces to the four corners of campus. Today the site holds the Business Building, the Forest Resources Building and the Food Science Building, as well as the Berkey Creamery, a parking deck, and the Tulip Tree Promenade, gift of the class of 2006. Across Park Avenue, the Arboretum at Penn State beckons walkers to visit—any time of year.
